

Fair use is a crucial right protected by our nation's copyright laws. Though you may not realize it, all Congressional staffers rely on fair use daily. A few examples of how Fair Use is important to every day tasks on the Hill include:

Displaying a meme poster to supplement your boss' committee remarks



Reading aloud from a constituent letter in a floor speech



- Playing a clip from a documentary at an event to provide context when unveiling a bill
- Posting a TikTok of your boss dancing to a trending song



- Emailing a copy of a recent op-ed in a "Dear Colleague" letter to other Members of Congress
- Posting a CNN clip to social media of your boss speaking in committee



- Including a newspaper clipping in a constituent newsletter
- Using ChatGPT to summarize a lengthy research article about a policy issue



Using tools like Google Alerts and TVeyes to track media coverage of your boss, their state or district, and their signature issues

About Fair Use:

Fair use allows for the use of copyrighted materials for a socially beneficial and transformative purpose without permission from the copyright holder. Fair use is determined based on four factors:

- the purpose and character of the use
- the amount and substantiality of the portion taken
- 3 the nature of the work
- the effect of the use on the market for the original work
